GBA Welcomes NIAC Report on Education Funding

The GBA has called for an urgent overhaul of school funding following the Northern Ireland Affairs Committee report on Education Funding.

The GBA welcomed the Committee's acknowledgement that there are unmanageable pressures on school budgets and schools urgently need more funding to address growing pressures.

As the representative body for the 50 voluntary grammar schools in Northern Ireland, the GBA is well aware of the financial pressures outlined in the report and consistently advocates for greater funding for education in Northern Ireland. In oral and written evidence to the inquiry, the GBA stated the levels of funding allocated in the education budget were not sufficient to maintain let alone improve educational outcomes.

The finance survey recently conducted by the GBA showed an average of 88.8% of delegated school budgets are spent on staffing costs. In some cases, schools spent over 95% of their annual budgets on teaching staff. Given this position schools have very limited options for discretionary spend.

Terry McDaid, Chairman of the GBA stated, "After a decade of real-term funding cuts a review of education funding is long overdue. Until now schools have been forced to absorb the real terms reduction to the budget which has lead to increasing numbers of schools in deficit. This cannot be sustained, budget allocations for education must rise not only in line with inflation but also reflect the increasing numbers of pupils in the system.

If funding continues at current levels there will undoubtedly be a detrimental impact on curricular and extra-curricular opportunities available to pupils."

Calls for urgent investment in education amid funding 'crisis'

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SCHOOLS are urging greater investment in education to help tackle a funding "crisis".

The Northern Ireland Affairs Committee (NIAC) yesterday published a report following its inquiry into education budgets.

It found increasing numbers of children with special needs were piling pressure on school finances.

The NIAC report shows that in the two and a half years since Stormont collapsed, a growing funding crisis resulted in "unmanageable pressures" on schools.

The Governing Bodies Association (GBA), which represents 50 grammar schools, welcomed the report and called for "urgent much-needed investment".

In oral and written evidence to the NIAC inquiry, the GBA said the levels of funding allocated in the education budget were not sufficient to maintain, let alone improve, outcomes.

A survey by the GBA found an average of 88.8 per cent of delegated school budgets were spent on staffing costs. In some cases, schools spent more than 95 per cent on teaching and non-teaching staff. Given this position schools have significant constraints and options for reducing costs have been exhausted.

"After a decade of real-term funding cuts a review of education funding is long overdue," GBA chairman Terry McDaid said.

"Over the past 10 years our schools have had to absorb real-terms cuts to their budgets. The report clearly indicates that this position can no longer be sustained, and that urgent



funding intervention is needed.

"Schools across the education sector will be forced to make cuts to curricular and extra-curricular provision which is hugely unfair to pupils attending schools. This position cannot be sustained. The budget allocations for education must rise not only in line with inflation but also to reflect the increasing numbers of pupils in the system."

The Children's Commissioner, Koviola Yassouma backed calls from the NIAC for Secretary of State Karen Bradley to act.

"I support the committee's call to the secretary of state to ensure that the education budget meets the needs of children, particularly those with special education needs," she said.

"I am frustrated that this is further evidence of the impact that no assembly or executive is having on our children's education."

The NASUWT union said it "broadly welcomed" the findings.

"Many of the issues identified by the committee predate the collapse of Stormont and have their

origins in decisions taken by the Westminster government," General Secretary Chris Keates said.

"The committee has recognised that education in Northern Ireland is in crisis and schools urgently need more money to address the growing pressures facing staff, pupils and parents."

Education Authority Board Nomination

In March 2019 the Permanent Secretary reappointed Board Members of the Education Authority for a one-year term. Our representative on the Board, Sir Gerry Loughran, has indicated that he will not seek a further term on the Board when his term ends in March 2020. We would like to thank Sir Gerry for his strong leadership and valuable contribution during his tenure as a Board member.

The GBA is now beginning the process of shortlisting candidates to represent the Voluntary Grammar sector on the Board and the Executive has agreed the following criteria for the appointment:

- The nominee must be a serving Governor of a Voluntary Grammar School with a term of office extending to at least 3 years of the EA Board appointment (due to the time commitment and potential conflicts of interest, Teacher Governors will not be eligible).

- The nominee must be either a serving member of the GBA Executive or willing to become a member, either elected or co-opted, with a period of office extending to the end of the EA Board appointment.
- The nominee must be able to devote sufficient time to EA Board membership duties. This may not be possible for persons in full-time employment unless self-employed or with enough flexibility in working arrangements.

Please note that the Department may require more than one nominee from which to make an appointment.

Terry McDaid, the GBA Chairman will be writing to your school to encourage your Board of Governors to make a nomination. Nominations should be sent to nuala@gbani.org by 5.00pm on 31st October 2019.

Shared Education

Applications to both the CASE programme and the mainstreamed Shared Education Signature Project are now closed as both programmes are full.
